Did you know: Hewett was wheelchair tennis's youngest men's singles world No.1 when, aged 20, he claimed the top spot for the first time in January 2018. Aged 19, he was also the sport's youngest Singles Masters men's champion in 2017 and the first Briton to win the year-end championship. He is a 16-time Grand Slam champion partnering Gordon Reid, with whom he won the men's doubles silver medal at the Rio 2016 and Tokyo 2020 Paralympics; He is a passionate Norwich City fan. Hewett and doubles partner Gordon Reid were made OBEs in the King's Birthday Honours list.

He was upgraded to an OBE in the King's Birthday Hounours list announced last weekend. Reid is a 21-time Grand Slam champion and he and fellow Brit Alfie Hewett, also made an OBE in the King's Birthday Honours list, own the record for most Grand Slam doubles titles in a row after winning ther 10th successive Grand Slam men's doubles tittle at the 2022 French Open. 
