[5] Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #13) vs. Katie Boulter (GBR #32)

First Meeting

First career meeting between the pair... **Ostapenko** is a former champion at Eastbourne (won title in 2021; d. Kontaveit in final) and has a 17-6 record at the tournament... **Ostapenko** has reached the 3r or better at Eastbourne from 2017-2023... **Ostapenko** is ranked seventh on Tour this year in wins (24)... **Boulter** avenged her Eastbourne 2023 1r loss against Martic this year, defeating her in 1r... **Boulter** is aiming for her first Top 20 win since downing No.13 Beatriz Haddad Maia at Miami 2024... **Boulter** is ranked fifth on Tour in percentage of first serves won (71.1%), and currently has the most wins so far on grass courts this season (6)

[WC] Emma Raducanu (GBR #168) vs. [2] Jessica Pegula (USA #5)

Pegula leads 1-0

Second meeting, with **Pegula** winning the only previous matchup at Cincinnati 2022... **Raducanu's** win in the previous round over Sloane Stephens was the fifth-best win-by-ranking of her 2024 season... **Raducanu** is seeking the first Top 10 win of her career today... **Raducanu** is ranked eighth on Tour in percentage of break points saved, with 62.3%... **Pegula** is playing her first match since winning the championship in Berlin; it was her first title on grass courts (d. Kalinskaya in final)... **Pegula** has not lost to a grand slam singles champion this season (defeated Gauff and Azarenka)... **Pegula** is currently 5-1 on grass courts in 2024

[4] Madison Keys (USA #12) vs. Anhelina Kalinina (UKR #44)

Kalinina leads 3-0

Keys is making fifth main-draw appearance at Eastbourne (sixth overall)... Keys is a two-time champion here Eastbourne, having won the tournament in 2023 (d. Kasatkina in F) and 2014 (d. Kerber in F)... Keys is playing her first grass event of 2024... Keys owns seven wins in 2024 over Top 50 players, most recently No.39 Xinyu Wang at Strasbourg 2024... Kalinina is making her third appearance at Eastbourne, where her previous best result was a quarterfinal run in 2022 (l. Ostapenko), which is also her best result on grass... Kalinina is playing her second grass event of 2024 season, having made 2r at Birmingham last week (l. eventual champion Putintseva)...As a qualifier, Kalinina has defeated Grey and Davis to make the main draw and beat Sorana Cirstea in 1r... A win today would be Kalinina's third Top 15 win of 2024 season, having defeated No.2 Aryna Sabalenka at Miami 2and No.6 Marketa Vondrousova at Strasbourg

Elise Mertens (BEL #33) vs. [3] Jasmine Paolini (ITA #7)

Mertens leads 4-1

Mertens and **Paolini** are playing for the sixth time in career, and for the first time on grass... **Mertens** has won four of their previous five meetings, most recently in the championship match at Monastir 2023... **Paolini**'s sole victory over **Mertens** was at Indian Wells 2021... **Mertens** is making seventh appearance at Eastbourne, where her previous best result was 3r run in 2019 (I. Pliskova)... A win today would be **Mertens**' first Top 10 win of 2024 season, having lost of her previous meetings against such opponents - I. No.4 Rybakina at Brisbane and Roland Garros, I. No.3 Gauff at Indian Wells, I. No.1 Swiatek at Stuttgart... No.3 seed **Paolini** is playing her first

CAREER MILESTONES

- Won sixth career title at 2023 Birmingham (d. Krejcikova in F) and reached SF at Rome; in doubles achieved R-Up at Doha (w/L.Kichenok)
- At 2022 Dubai, lifted fifth career singles title (d. Kudermetova in F); finished R-Up at Eastbourne (l. Kvitova) and Seoul (l. Alexandrova) as well as SF at St. Petersburg and Doha
- Won two doubles titles in 2022 at Birmingham and Cincinnati (both w/L.Kichenok); qualified for WTA Finals reaching SF Lifted first grass court title at 2021 Eastbourne (as WC, d. Kontaveit in F)
- In 2021, also finished R-Up at Luxembourg (l. Tauson), made SF at Indian Wells (l. Azarenka), reached QF at Rome and represented Latvia at the Tokyo Olympics (l. Vesnina in 1r)
- Won doubles title at 2021 Moscow (w/Siniakova)
- Highlights of 2020 season included three Top 10 wins and reaching QF at Strasbourg
- Finished R-Up in doubles w/Dabrowski at 2020 Doha (l. Hsieh/Strycova)
- 2019 season saw her capture third career title at Luxembourg (d. Goerges in F) right after finishing R-Up at Linz (l. Gauff)
- Also R-Up in mixed doubles at 2019 Wimbledon w/Lindstedt
- 2018 campaign highlighted by finishing R-Up at Miami (l. Stephens); beat No.9 Petra Kvitova and No.4 Elina Svitolina to register multiple Top 10 wins in the same tournament for the first time
- Reached SF at 2018 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Kerber) to become first Latvian woman to reach final four at All England Club
- Achieved career-high ranking of No.5 on March 19, 2018
- In doubles won title at 2018 Doha (w/Dabrowski)
- Enjoyed career-best season in 2017, finishing the year in the Top 10 for the first time (at No.7); was No.44 at end of 2016 (first Top 50 finish) and No.79 at end of 2015 (first Top 100 finish)
- Champion at 2017 Roland Garros (d. Halep in F) becoming first woman to win first tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Barbara Jordan at 1979 Australian Open. Also became the first unseeded player to lift the trophy in the Open Era and the first Latvian player to reach the championship match at a Grand Slam
- Followed up title run with QF appearance at 2017 Wimbledon; also won title at Seoul (d. Haddad Maia in F) and reached final at Charleston (l. Kasatkina)
- Qualified for debut WTA Finals in 2017 went 1-2 in group stage

- In 2023 captured first WTA singles title of career on home soil at Nottingham; made Top 50 debut at No.50 the week of September 11; advanced to 3r at Wimbledon for second year in a row (l. Rybakina), and at US Open for first time (l. Stearns).
- Also in 2023, reached 2r as qualifier at both Montreal and Beijing; on ITF Circuit won one singles title at Canberra and reached two finals in Japan; went 2-0 in singles in November's Billie Jean King Cup play-offs against Sweden
- During the 2022 grass court season, advanced to QF at Nottingham (ret. vs. Davis w/right elbow injury) and 2r at Wimbledon (l. Sabalenka)
- Opened 2021 season by reaching 3r at the Gippsland Trophy in Melbourne (l. Osaka); upset No.14 seed Gauff in 2r
- Ended 2020 by finishing R-Up at \$15k ITF/Sharm El-Sheikh-EGY. Earlier in the year, made 2r at Acapulco (l. Zhu) and fell 1r at Australian Open (l. Svitolina) in only Tour-level outings
- Suffered a stress fracture in her back which forced her out for much of 2019. Best results prior to injury were 2r showing at Australian Open and SF run at \$25K ITF/Solapur-IND (l. Raina)
- Won the WTA's first-ever 10-point match tiebreak at a Slam to see off Makarova in 1r at 2019 Australian Open
- Reached career-high No.82 on February 18, 2019
- Broke into the Top 100 the week of October 15, 2018
- Made significant strides in 2018, reaching first WTA QF of career at Nottingham (l. eventual champion Barty) - defeated Stosur en route for her first win over a Grand Slam winner. Also enjoyed QF run at Tianjin (d. No.432 Sakkari, l. Ka.Pliskova) and R-Up finish at \$100K ITF/Southsea-GBR (l. Flipkens)
- Also in 2018, reached 2r for the first time at a major, at Wimbledon (d. Cepede Royg, l. Osaka)
- Part of Great Britain Fed Cup Team, 2018-19
- Fell 1r on tour level main draw singles debut at 2017 Wimbledon (as WC, l. McHale)
- On ITF Circuit, winner of six singles titles and four doubles titles
- Played first professional events of career on ITF Circuit in Britain in 2011
- Appeared in girls' singles at all four Slams, reaching 3r at Australian Open, Wimbledon and US Open, and was R-Up in doubles at 2014 Australian Open (w/Jorovic, l. Kalinina/Kulichkova). Other junior highlights include winning Lemon Bowl in Rome at age of

- Made Top 10 debut at No.10 on September 11, 2017
- In doubles, won first and second career titles in 2017, at St. Petersburg (w/Rosolska) and Stuttgart (w/Atawo) Breakthrough result of 2016 season was reaching final at Doha launching her into Top 50 at No.40 (l. Suárez Navarro); also in 2016 reached SF at Katowice and QF at Birmingham and Florianopolis ending year at No.44
- Ended 2015 at No.79 for first Top 100 finish (up from No.308 in 2014). Having leapt 229 spots, was second highest year-end rankings jump, after Kasatkina who went from No.370 to No.72 (298 spots)
- Highlights of 2014 were reaching first career WTA final at Quebec City (l. Beck) and 2r at Wimbledon and US Open
- Scored first Top 10 win over No.9 Carla Suárez Navarro in 1r at 2015 Wimbledon
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2014 Tashkent as WC advancing to 2r (l. Pervak)
- Played qualifying at Moscow in 2012
- Member of Latvian Billie Jean King Cup team in 2013-2022
- Began professional career playing ITF in 2012 winning first career title at \$10k/ITF Stockholm, SWE; owns seven career ITF titles


