WINDSOR HIGH SCHOOL AND SIXTH FORM, WEST MIDLANDS:

ran a course for their BTEC Sport groups and a course for Year 7 girls.

They invited primary schools to take part in the Mini Red Y3&4 competition and a KS1 tennis festival. The leaders supported at other School Games events including Boccia, SEND, multi-skills and archery, projecting positive experiences of sport and competition at inter-school and intra-school events. These activities are great PR for Windsor High School, strengthening relationships with local primaries and supporting the personal development of the young leaders.

Out of the 14 Year 7 girls, 6 were Pupil Premium, 2 EAL and 3 SEND. In their community work, they are inspiring others to overcome barriers – or perceived barriers – to sports and leadership participation.

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Lower ability students often make really good leaders, and the girls LOVED the experience. The plan is that some of the girls will form part of our Leadership Academy and run sessions in local primary schools."

AT BRADFORD GRAMMAR SCHOOL, YORKSHIRE:

10 pupils took the optional Tennis Leaders course.

All additional modules were delivered by the Head of PE across a number of weeks in the summer term 21/22. BGS already teaches tennis as part of the curriculum to all age groups, has a tennis programme and is a club sponsor for Skipton Tennis Club. The partnership is founded on the school and club sharing the same core values, including the desire to open up tennis in the Craven district.

This collaboration enables Skipton to offer free weekly junior social tennis to all children in the area but mostly focused on KS2 / secondary age. This successful initiative opens up tennis to the wider community and attracts new players who enjoy both sport and socialising.



JOHN KYRLE HIGH SCHOOL, HEREFORDSHIRE offered Tennis Leaders exclusively to girls to encourage female participation in sports leadership.

Since the course, leaders have helped run the School Games Tennis event organised by the SGO and held at the school. They have also supported community sessions and run inter-school competitions.

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Links with the primary school enable course attendees develop their leadership skills."

DITCHAM PARK SCHOOL, HAMPSHIRE

delivered Tennis Leaders as an "activity" PE lesson in the summer term to 19 pupils from Year 9 to Year 11 studying PE GCSE.

Some of the tennis leaders are now assisting at their local tennis clubs, demonstrating confidence and commitment. Those undertaking the DofE Bronze Award used the course as their skill activity over three months.

ATLANTIC RACQUET CENTRE, DEVON

delivered Tennis Leaders free of charge to approximately 120 Year 10 pupils across two local secondary schools.

The leaders completed the Helping at a Competition module at ARC then assisted at a school competition or festival event. The students who took part were all GCSE PE students studying the Sports Leader award. The majority were new to tennis and the gender split was approximately 50/50.

Stand-out leaders (about 10% of the cohort) were invited to help deliver the coaching programme at the centre and around half became regular volunteers at competitions, helping the tournament referee.
