TENNIS LEADERS CASE STUDY



TOP TIPS

- Try to help pupils put their leadership skills to use as soon as possible, such as linking with a club or involving them in your own tennis programme/clubs
- Include lower ability or disadvantaged pupils the results have been really positive
- Consider partnering with a club or venue who will deliver
 Tennis Leaders the pupils often co-operate well with a coach.

WINDSOR HIGH SCHOOL AND SIXTH FORM, WEST MIDLANDS

chose to run two Tennis Leaders courses: one for their cohort of BTEC Sport students and one for Year 7 girls.

They invited primary schools to take part in the Mini Red Y3&4 competition, with the BTEC Sport students leading this event. The girls planned and ran a KS1 tennis festival for local primary schools. The leaders supported at other School Games events including Boccia, SEND, multi-skills and archery.

Out of the 14 Year 7 girls, 6 were Pupil Premium, 2 EAL and 3 SEND. Despite these potential barriers to participation, Tennis Leaders content is designed for a range of abilities, and the girls successfully developed leadership, teamwork, confidence and enthusiasm for the game.



The plan is that some of the girls will form part of our Leadership Academy and run sessions in local primary schools."

JOHN KYRLE HIGH SCHOOL, HEREFORDSHIRE

offered Tennis Leaders exclusively to girls to encourage female participation in sports leadership.

Students who attended a tennis club, coaching or were part of the competitive team during the previous summer were selected, and the group included one Pupil Premium and one EAL. Since the course, leaders have helped run the School Games Tennis event organised by the SGO and held at the school. They also support community sessions and run inter-school competitions.



My students got a lot out of the fact that they were being led by a professional LTA tennis coach rather than their PE teacher. They also liked using lots of different tennis equipment that we don't have lots of (or at all) in school."

AT BRADFORD GRAMMAR SCHOOL, YORKSHIRE,

10 pupils took the optional Tennis Leaders course.

All additional modules were delivered by the Head of PE across a number of weeks in the summer term 21/22. The school already teaches tennis as part of the curriculum to all age groups, has a tennis programme, and sponsors Skipton Tennis Club. Pupils undertaking the Tennis Leaders course are rewarded with real-world, long-term volunteer and coaching experiences at Skipton.

DITCHAM PARK SCHOOL, HAMPSHIRE

delivered Tennis Leaders to 19 pupils from Year 9 to Year 11 studying PE GCSE.

Undertaking the core module and an elective module (Helping at a School) enabled them to competently help teachers deliver the school's sports provision.

ATLANTIC RACQUET CENTRE, DEVON

delivered Tennis Leaders to approximately 120 Year 10 pupils across two local secondary schools free of charge.

Having completed the core module at their respective schools, the leaders completed the Helping at a Competition module at ARC on the morning of a school competition or festival event. The leaders then stayed for the afternoon to help with these, plus multiple events during the year. This successful model works for all parties and provides an opportunity for pupils to immediately put their learning into practice.

About 10% of the cohort were invited back to help deliver the centre's coaching programme. For those not picked, their journey has not ended. Having discovered an interest in the game, many joined ARC's teen tennis sessions, adding a new interest and qualification to their CV.



It was incredible to see the leaders step up and work as a team to help us deliver the events. We encouraged the stand-out stars to work alongside our coaches at ARC on weekends and evenings and complete the Level 1 qualification. My favourite thing about this programme is that many of those stars are non-tennis players initially, but through the Tennis Leaders qualification they find a love for tennis and a way to get involved."
